Kevin is an award-winning producer, director and writer who has worked in media since 1982. After graduate school at Stanford and San Francisco State University, Kevin free-lanced for ITV, CBS News, PBS, and several production companies. In 1984, he founded the production company, Full Frame Productions, https://fullframeprod.com. In 1988 he co-founded the nonprofit media organization, Filmmakers Collaborative SF https://filmmakerscollaborative.org. Kevin has served as the Executive Director of Filmmakers Collaborative SF and as the principal Producer/Director for Full Frame Productions since inception.

As a filmmaker, Kevin has produced and directed dozens of films and several series for broadcast and independent distribution. His award-winning work has been featured on PBS, Discovery, National Geographic, Bravo, and several VOD platforms. His films have screened at dozens of film festivals, including the Berlin Film Festival, SF International Film Festival (Golden Gate Award Recipient), Wild and Scenic Film Festival (Spirit of Activism Award), SF Green Film Festival (Green Fire award) and many others.

In 2010, Kevin and his producing partner David Donnenfield were the recipients of the Harold Gilliam Excellence in Environmental Reporting Award for their work on the *How On Earth* TV series. In addition, Kevin has been a featured speaker at conferences, colleges, and festivals often discussing the use of visual storytelling to move hearts and minds. Kevin also consults frequently with filmmakers on all facets of filmmaking, including creative approach, storytelling, proposal writing, fundraising, and distribution. He is also on the Board of Directors for several other nonprofit media organizations.

When Rules Don't Apply, Producer (with David Donnenfield, Director) 2019.

A half hour documentary featuring reporter Rachael Myrow, exploring the "no-poach" wage suppression conspiracy that swept Silicon Valley from 2005 to 2015, and the precedent-setting legal battles that challenged these practices. Leading tech CEOs, including Apple's Steve Jobs and Google's Eric Schmidt, secretly agreed not to recruit one another's employees, thus restricting employee job opportunities and limiting their wages.

Kashia Pomo Tribal Traditions in Marine Protected Areas, Producer/Director, 2019. A short film on the empowering nature of tribal and cultural identity, profiling how the Kashia Band of Pomo Indians have become uniquely positioned through their history and traditional practices and values to be an important partner in the recovery of our coastal resources. Invited to Wild and Scenic, and several other festivals and public screenings. Part of a four-part series for the California Marine Protected Areas.

Facing Assumptions, Producer/Director, Interactive Exhibit, California Museum, 2018. The Unity Center at the California Museum celebrates the state's diverse people, customs and cultures. Kevin produced and directed an interactive exhibit with West Office Exhibits, entitled Facing Assumptions, where visitors are immersed in conversations between members of marginalized groups including African American Women, Latino Immigrants, Transgender/Gender Non-Conforming Youth, Parents with Disabilities, and Muslim Youth who share deeply personal experiences facing common stereotypes and misconceptions.

A half-hour documentary that tells the story of the Desert Training Center, located in the Mojave Desert in California, where new soldiers prepared for the rigors of combat in WWII. PBS broadcast with lead station KOCE resulted in 450 broadcasts and carriage in 40 of the top 50 markets.
